- Assess the nutritional needs of patients
- Provide counseling to adapt diet to the patient's changing status
- Assess patient/family response to care: access to food/nutritional supplements, ability to prepare food, adequate tools and space, nutritional risk
- Provide in-service education to hospice staff and educational tools for patients and families
- Collaborate with the nursing staff in applying a nutritional risk assessment, determining the need for a mechanically altered diet or assess the effect of end stage disease on hydration and nutrition
